Payment, Cancellation, & No Show Policy

- Payment for participation in the 2024 NYAAE June Professional Development Conference is due by May 10th, 2024.
 - A late payment fee will be added to all registrations that we have no payment or PO on file by May 10th, 2024.
 - Additional late fees may apply if payment is delayed further.
- Those who register between 1/15 and 3/15/24 will be able to pay with credit card or submit a PO.
 - After 3/15/24, only credit cards will be accepted as payment through the registration system.
- Registration fees will increase by \$60 on March 15th, 2024- be sure to register early.
- Should you need to cancel your registration, our policy is:
